

The Joint Fund for Graduate Research, also known as the Joint Fund for Support of Graduate Student Research and Scholarship, was initiated to help support the creation of events (conferences, lectures) that bring external participants to share their research and interact with Western graduate students.

Research Western, the Society of Graduate Students (SOGS), and the School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (SGPS) have formed a partnership, annually contributing to \$6,000 apiece to a jointly administered fund, designed to aid these events. The maximum amount awarded to each successful application is \$1,000.



Applications are accepted throughout the year. <u>Application form</u> is available online.

Travel Subsidy: Up to \$500 per term for academic conference travel-related expenses.

Professional Placement and Experiential Learning Subsidy: Up to \$500 per term for travel-related expenses for Category II members undertaking professional placements, practicums, co-ops or other experiential learning opportunities.

Child Care Subsidy: Up to \$400 per term for child care services costs.



Emergency Loan: Up to \$1000, payable in three monthly installments.

Applicants must demonstrate financial need. Application deadline for all subsidies is the last business day of each term in April, October, and December. Response to concerns related to change in access to course material on OWL

Summary of memorandum sent August 25, 2017 from Janice Deakin, Provost & Vice-President (Academic)

Provost & Vice-President (Academic) addressed "concerns being raised by members of our community and reported in the student Gazette about the recent change in access to course material archived" on the online learning management system, OWL. "A new automated process was initiated by Western Technology Services on August 9 to remove student access to course material stored on OWL older than Spring/Summer 2017."

Provost Deakin indicated that the rationale for the implementation of this automated process was because OWL was not originally designed to act as a permanent storage for archival course material. She also reported that "the decision to initiate this process was not taken in response to the recent federal court decision in Access Copyright vs. York University."

Ms. Deakin acknowledged the unfortunate and unintended consequences for some OWL users – mainly that the automated process was not preceded with any prior communication to advise it was happening – and recognizes the negative implications for some who had relied on OWL as an archive for old course materials.

"Western Libraries staff will be available to assist students in accessing some course reading materials formerly archived on OWL; this can be done by contacting <u>wlfeedback@uwo.ca</u>." Deakin assures community members who have "been impacted that they are working to address other pedagogical concerns and questions related to publishing and republishing course material to OWL. "

WTS implemented this process to address ongoing student complaints regarding the need for simplifying student access to current course materials.

Consolidation of SHS and SDC

Summary of memorandum sent August 25, 2017 from Janice Deakin, Provost & Vice-President (Academic)

Dr. Mike Condra (Queen's University) conducted a Student Mental Health and Wellness review for Western in February 2017. His report offers several recommendations to address the challenge that student's –especially those in distress– face when attempting to access the wide range of mental health and wellness services on campus, with the ultimate goal of enhancing students' timely and effective access to mental health and wellness supports.

One recommendation being implemented from the Condra Report was a review and redeployment of funding in support of Services for Students with Disabilities as a means of coping more effectively with mounting caseloads in this area, particularly in relation to mental health disabilities.

Rick Ezekiel is working with representatives from campus services on transitioning to shared electronic health records accessible to mental health counsellors and health care practitioners across our campus. A needs assessment report will be drafted that includes a system recommendation and implementation plan for piloting a shared EHR beginning in January 2018.

The longer-term goal, based on Condra's recommendations, is to develop a consolidated Student Health and Wellness Centre (SMHWC), located in a purpose-built space, that will house services currently offered by Health Services, Psychological Services and the Campus-Case Manager, with direct reporting relationships to the Wellness Education Centre and Residence Counsellor.


